Brief History of Asian Pacific American Heritage Month

In the late 19th century, U.S. federal law openly targeted Chinese immi-



grants. The Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882 prohibited the immigration of Chinese laborers to the U.S. for 10 years, and was renewed by the Geary Act, which additionally required immigrants from China to carry permits at all times or face possible deportation. (It was not until more than 60 years later, in 1943, that Con-

gress repealed the exclusion — and even then the law allowed only 105 Chinese people to enter the country each year.) The month of May was selected for two reasons: First, to commemorate the arrival of the first known Japanese immigrant to the U.S. on May 7, 1843; secondly, to honor the completion of the transcontinental railroad on May 10, 1869 — the building of which up to 20,000 Chinese workers participated in.

. In 1978, Horton and former California Rep. Norman Mineta introduced a bill that called for the week beginning on May 4 — which would include the dates of the two key events — to be designated as Asian Pacific American Heritage Week. After the joint resolution was passed by Congress, President Jimmy Carter signed it into law and thus the commemorative occasion began as a week.

In 1990, the commemorative week expanded to a commemorative month after a new bill was passed by Congress and signed into law by President George H.W. Bush. Even then, the proclamation did not include an annual designation, and the president had to reauthorize May as Asian Pacific American Heritage Month annually in the coming years. It was not until 1992 when Horton, along with multiple co-sponsors, introduced the legislation that would permanently designate May as the commemorative month — a legislation that became law after receiving unanimous support in Congress.

To assimilate old and new Asian residents of the

region into this community. Their goals include promoting Oriental culture, encouraging participation, and furthering growth within our community. Since 2020 pandemic started, NPDC donated PPE items to the front line, hospitals and police stations. Hosted and partnership with local councilmen office and local clinic, provide free COVID-19 registration and free vaccination. Moreover, they hosted more than 3 years food distribution. NPDC continually provide community services such as monthly diaper giveaway, senior septa pass, city card, free file tax return, free translation service in NPDC office. Trying to develop any services which are benefits to the community. Therefore, I think Mr. Xiao should be a good fit for the Pan Asian award in this year.

Welcome to Asian Pacific American Heritage Month Celebrations. Pan Asian Association of Greater Philadelphia pleased to host Annual Award Banquet to kickoff Asian Heritage month.

APA Heritage Month was first established in 1977 when Representatives Frank Horton and Norman Mineta and Senators Daniel Inouye and Spark Matsunaga introduced resolutions asking the President to declare the first ten days of May (the month when the first Japanese immigrants arrived in the U.S. in 1843) as Asian/Pacific Heritage Week. In 1978 President Carter made it an annual event and in 1990, President George H.W. Bush proclaimed the entire month of May to be Asian Pacific American Heritage Month.

Pan Asian Association is a non-profit, non-political, non-sectarian organization formed in 1983 primarily for cultural and educational purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c) (3) and 509 (a) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, specifically, its aims and objectives are:

a. To provide a common platform to the various Asian member organizations in the Greater Philadelphia area for pursuing their common goals and sharing their concerns;

b. To promote, coordinate and support joint efforts in the social, cultural, educational and charitable activities of the member organizations;

c. To provide civic and political education to the people of Asian origin and encourage greater participation by them in public affairs and to enhance their contribution to the society at large;

d. To foster friendship and understanding between people of Asian origin and others.

Solomon Kim has been a supporter of the Asian American Community in Philadelphia for many years. He served as the Senior Vice President of the Korean American Association of Greater Philadelphia from 2019 to 2022. During this time he helped KAAGP partner with the Korean American Chamber of Commerce in assisting Korean American businesses after the

rioting and looting in 2020. Through his efforts they were able to secure grants through the Merchant Fund.

Solomon served as the chair for Korea In Philly, an event to celebrate the 50th anniversary of KAAGP. This was a landmark event that highlighted the Korean American community through a Traditional Korean fashion show, Taekwondo demonstrations, dance performances, a 5k Run and Korean food vendors. Over 2000 people attended the event. KAAGP partnered with various organizations including the Montgomery Community College, the Valley Forge Convention and Visitors Bureau, the Asian American Chamber of Commerce and over 40 Korean American Associations.

Solomon continues to support the Asian American community as a member of the board of directors for KAAGP, the Asian American Chamber of Commerce of Greater Philadelphia, the Montgomery County Workforce Advisory Board, the leadership team of NAAAP and other positions.

OUTSTANDING NON PROFIT AWARD



For almost 36 years, the Asian American Women's Coalition (AAWC) has been a multi-cultural group dedicated to the concerns of all Asian American Women and the promotion of advancement of Asian American Women through leadership and mutual support.

In 1995, AAWC established the Cecilia Moy Yep Scholarship Fund to assist financially disadvantaged Asian American female students from all cultural backgrounds to advance themselves in their chosen field of endeavor. In 1996, AAWC celebrated their tenth anniversary and awarded their first scholarship. Multiple scholarships are awarded each year in varying amounts and were awarded even through the COVID-19 pandemic. At the most recent Annual Banquet, over \$56,000 in scholarships were awarded to 24 Asian American female high school graduating students of Philadelphia, Delaware, Montgomery, Chester, and Bucks counties for their college/university studies starting in the fall. AAWC has provided a total of 324 Scholarships to Asian female high students.

Throughout its history, the AAWC has spearheaded numerous activities for the Asian American community in the Greater Philadelphia region that increase public awareness of the diversity of Asian cultures and enhance the quality of life for Asian Americans.

The increase of Anti-Asian Hate during the height of COVID-19 garnered this request and with Officer Ung's experience, his presence has helped improve the community's sense of safety and community policing through building relationships with the high number of Southeast Asian and Latino immigrant and refugee residents and business owners. It is important to Officer Ung to cultivate trust with community members.
