IMPACT AWARD

DAVID OH



David served for three terms as a Philadelphia City Councilman At-Large (R) from 2012 to 2023. He was the first Asian American elected to political office in Philadelphia and the only veteran serving on Council during his years of service. David resigned in 2023 and is the first Asian American in Philadelphia's history to run for Mayor in the General

Election.

While serving on Council, David was Chair of the Committee on Global Opportunities and the Creative/Innovative Economy. At his own expense, David traveled to other cities and made several trips overseas to meet with business leaders, government officials and innovators about job creation, economic development, trade and investment.

David created and raised private funds hold several citywide annual events including, PHL LIVE Center Stage, First Responders Appreciation Day in Philadelphia, Youth Non-Profit Symposium and Korean American Day. David also created several advocacy organizations including Philly Neighborhood Small Business Council, Black Film Advisory Committee and the Eurasian American Roundtable. David championed job creation, education reform, the creative arts economy, innovation, veterans, tax reform, governmental compliance with the law and public safety. He initiated legal action against the City of Philadelphia for illegally shutting down Chinese takeout restaurants at 11pm; introduced laws that protected mothers from harassment and termination for pumping breast milk at work; created a veterans employment tax credit; set aside \$64 million to honor the firefighters contract; and fought against what he believed were violations of law by city government. David currently serves on the Philadelphia Tax Reform Commission

Brief History of Asian Pacific American Heritage Month

In the late 19th century, U.S. federal law openly targeted Chinese immi-



grants. The Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882 prohibited the immigration of Chinese laborers to the U.S. for 10 years, and was renewed by the Geary Act, which additionally required immigrants from China to carry permits at all times or face possible deportation. (It was not until more than 60 years later, in 1943, that Con-

gress repealed the exclusion — and even then the law allowed only 105 Chinese people to enter the country each year.) The month of May was selected for two reasons: First, to commemorate the arrival of the first known Japanese immigrant to the U.S. on May 7, 1843; secondly, to honor the completion of the transcontinental railroad on May 10, 1869 — the building of which up to 20,000 Chinese workers participated in.

. In 1978, Horton and former California Rep. Norman Mineta introduced a bill that called for the week beginning on May 4 — which would include the dates of the two key events — to be designated as Asian Pacific American Heritage Week. After the joint resolution was passed by Congress, President Jimmy Carter signed it into law and thus the commemorative occasion began as a week.

In 1990, the commemorative week expanded to a commemorative month after a new bill was passed by Congress and signed into law by President George H.W. Bush. Even then, the proclamation did not include an annual designation, and the president had to reauthorize May as Asian Pacific American Heritage Month annually in the coming years. It was not until 1992 when Horton, along with multiple co-sponsors, introduced the legislation that would permanently designate May as the commemorative month — a legislation that became law after receiving unanimous support in Congress.



She also played a pivotal role in supporting the Korean Community Grant Response Committee, aiding Korean American businesses affected by the 2020 riots and looting.

In addition, Soojin's involvement with Korea In Philly in 2022, an event commemorating the 50th anniversary of KAAGP, attracted over 2000 attendees. She facilitated partnerships between KAAGP and numerous organizations, such as Philly Counts, MontCo Counts, PA Voter Registration, the Korean American Chamber of Commerce for Philadelphia (KACC), Montgomery County Immunization Coalition (MCIC), and more than 30 other Korean American organizations.

Furthermore, as President of NAKS-MAC (National Association for Korean Schools, Mid-Atlantic Chapter) since 2022, Soojin has played a pivotal role in coordinating approximately 30 Korean schools across the Tri-state region. Her leadership has fostered a strong sense of pride and identity in Korean heritage among students, with NAKS-MAC advancing its mission through language, cultural, and historical exchanges via friendly competitions and workshops.

Soojin's commitment to the Asian American community extends beyond her formal roles, as she continues to serve as Vice President and member of the Board of Directors for KAAGP, as well as President of NAKS-MAC

Welcome to Asian Pacific American Heritage Month Celebrations. Pan Asian Association of Greater Philadelphia pleased to host Annual Award Banquet to kickoff Asian Heritage month.

APA Heritage Month was first established in 1977 when Representatives Frank Horton and Norman Mineta and Senators Daniel Inouye and Spark Matsunaga introduced resolutions asking the President to declare the first ten days of May (the month when the first Japanese immigrants arrived in the U.S. in 1843) as Asian/Pacific Heritage Week. In 1978 President Carter made it an annual event and in 1990, President George H.W. Bush proclaimed the entire month of May to be Asian Pacific American Heritage Month.

Pan Asian Association is a non-profit, non-political, non-sectarian organization formed in 1983 primarily for cultural and educational purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c) (3) and 509 (a) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, specifically, its aims and objectives are:

- a. To provide a common platform to the various Asian member organizations in the Greater Philadelphia area for pursuing their common goals and sharing their concerns;
- b. To promote, coordinate and support joint efforts in the social, cultural, educational and charitable activities of the member organizations;
- c. To provide civic and political education to the people of Asian origin and encourage greater participation by them in public affairs and to enhance their contribution to the society at large;
- d. To foster friendship and understanding between people of Asian origin and others.

RAZIN KARU

Razin Karu was born and raised in India. He immigrated to the United States in 2013. He attended Bucks County Community College and earned an Associates degree with Honors in History. He served as the Student Government president 2016-17, Commencement

speaker 2017 and won College President's Cup 2017. He transferred to Temple University where he completed a Bachelors degree double majoring in History and Political Science, with double minors in Economics and Global Studies. At Temple University, Razin served as the

Speaker of the Student Parliament 2018-19. He was selected for the Junior Summer Institute program at Princeton University and received numerous scholarships.

After graduating, Razin worked as the Pennsylvania Outreach Coordinator for ICNA Relief USA, a national level nonprofit organization, serving the underserved in the United States. He spearheaded their Back2School program where he coordinated the distribution of around 3000 backpacks filled with essential school supplies each year across Pennsylvania. During COVID, Razin coordinated the USDA's Farmers to families food boxes program to address food insecurity in the Greater Philadelphia area. He recruited volunteers that helped distribute fresh produce and dairy to around 400 families every week during the summer of 2020. This further led to the establishment of a food pantry in Norristown which is serving hundreds of families even today.

Razin also worked part time at State Representative Perry Warren's office from 2019 to 2023 where he undertook legislative outreach and assisted constituents with availing state services such as: Free SEPTA senior passes, Property Tax Rent Rebates and Unemployment compensation during COVID years.

CATZIE VILAYPHONH



In 2012 Catzie Vilayphonh was awarded the Knight Foundation Challenge Arts Grant for \$25K to start "Laos In The House". The project was an initiative to engage the Lao American community through writing, performance and visual arts to promote storytelling as a healing medium

from the traumas of war. This culminated into the curation of a gallery exhibit and performance showcase featuring work by other Lao American artists for the very first time in Philadelphia in May 2015. A two month-long multidisciplinary gallery exhibition titled "Laos In The House: Voices From Four Decades Of The Lao Diaspora" debuted the work of 12 visual artists and also featured original drawings by UXO survivors in Laos, courtesy of Legacies of War.

Catzie Vilayphonh is an award-winning writer, spoken word poet and multimedia artist. As a founding member of the group Yellow Rage she was one of the first Asian American women to appear on HBO's Def Poetry Jam. Through her work, she provides an awareness not often heard, drawing from personal narrative. Throughout her artistic career Catzie has been a 2012 Creative Capital finalist, a 4-time Leeway Foundation honoree and was named a Woman Non-Profit Leader by Philadelphia City Council in 2016. She is a co-founding chair of the Lao American Writer Summit, a Commissioner on the Mayor's Commission on Asian American Affairs and was recently appointed as Councilmember to the Pennsylvania Council on The Arts.

A child of refugees, Catzie was born in camp, on the way to America, and thus considers herself part of the ".5 Generation". She resides in South Philly with her child Aditi.




